Manchester terrorist attack: tremendous work by the Greater Manchester emergency and NHS services

Our hearts go out to those killed and wounded in the Manchester Arena attack on Monday 22nd May, and also in London on Saturday 3rd June.

Part of the major incident response

Eight hospitals across Greater Manchester were part of the 'major incident' response on the Monday night (22nd May), including Stepping Hill. We dealt with major trauma casualties, as well as others with more minor injuries.

The NHS response was superb and well co-ordinated. We had all taken part in a Greater Manchester wide exercise on 29th March, called Exercise Socrates, which was a practice run for an incident like this.

Tremendous professionalism and resolve from teams

We saw tremendous professionalism and resolve from teams. From those already on duty, to those who came in and worked all night, as well as teams who picked up jobs the next day.

Staff who supported the frontline teams also played a vitally important role, as well as all the teams who made sure that all our other services continued as normal.

Inundated with offers of support from public, partners and businesses

Supermarkets and food outlets contacted us to kindly deliver free food and drinks over the week and following bank holiday weekend. NHS organisations and agencies, from Cheshire to Glasgow, offered their help. And many members of the public rang to offer their support and/or make donations.

VIP visits

Jeremy Hunt, health secretary and Andy Burnham, the new Greater Manchester Mayor both paid private visits to thank our emergency department and surgery staff after the attack.

A&E four hour wait target: 85% for April and hit 95% target last week

We achieved 85% for the A&E four hour wait target for April, which hit our improvement trajectory.

Last week (w/c 29th May), we achieved the 95% target which is our best week for a long time. The national target is 95% patients being admitted/referred/discharged within four hours.

More patients are going through our ambulatory care and ambulatory ill units on our hospital site, which is reducing pressure on our emergency department. Delayed transfers of care increased in April (average 30 per day), but the new transfer hub has opened on our site (covered further on).

Quality for April: update on key areas where we failed to hit the target

PATIENT EXPERIENCE (*Friends & Family test, 40% target response rate for inpatient & day cases*): 93% patients said they were 'extremely likely' or 'likely' to recommend us in April, but we had a low response rate (31%).

DISCHARGE SUMMARY (95% published within 48 hrs) & CLINIC LETTERS (95% within 14 days):

Discharge summary was 86.5%. Clinic (outpatient) letters were 60% for April.

PRESSURE ULCERS (zero for 2017/18):

One pressure ulcer was confirmed as avoidable in April.

Financial update: £15 million cost improvement for 2017/18

Our annual budget is £303 million and we are planning a £27.4 million deficit for 2017/18.

We are planning a £15 million cost improvement programme (recurrent, ie: year on year) for 2017/18.

Importantly, we are investing £13.6 million in site improvements and equipment, including our electronic patient record over the year.

New Transfer Hub: integrated transfer team now up and running

The new Transfer Hub is now open on our Stepping Hill Hospital site (located on former Ward 14).

It is being run by the new integrated transfer team, which includes discharge co-ordinators, continuing healthcare nurse assessor, mental health community psychiatric nurse, social workers, ward trackers and Age UK placement team.

This new service is part of the new 'transfer to assess' approach, where patient gets an assessment of what they need to return home away from ward. Patients will be supported at home by the 'active recovery team', and this approach will help reduce delayed discharges and maintain independence.

Adrian Belton, new Chair: officially started on 1st June 2017

Adrian Belton officially started as our new Chair of Stockport NHS Foundation Trust on 1st June 2017. Adrian is a successor to Gillian Easson who announced her retirement last October, after 10 years with the Trust.
