Carrying out the scans within the maternity department also means swifter scans and improved waiting times.




# SAFEST FOR JOINT

Recently outside of work and whilst completing a sponsored charity event, Ross came to the assistance of a member of the public who suffered a collapse and cardiac arrest.

He was able to use his knowledge from previous resuscitation training completed at work and showed that 'he cares' outside of work too. He delivered chest compressions, used a community defibrillator and successfully preserved this person's life.

Ross was grateful for having had the training that empowered him to know how to respond to the event.

All the team within Estates and Facilities are incredibly proud of Ross' contribution. He is now energised to assist the Estates and Facilities Matron to review the actions of Estates and Facilities teams should they be the first responder to an emergency scene and ensure that his colleagues feel as empowered as he did; empowered to assist and empowered to potentially to save a life.



Working with Dementia United, our crisis response team put into place the Person Centred Community Delirium Pathway, so that colleagues could better recognise and screen symptoms of delirium, which is a condition which causes a short-term confused state and develops over hours and days; as a result of underlying illness.

Diagnosing it sooner leads to better treatment and management of the condition.

# Meet your Governor

In this edition we speak to Sue Alting, **Appointed Governor from Age UK** Stockport, and Lead Governor for our **Council of Governors.** 

#### What got you involved as a Governor?

While most governors are elected, a few are appointed from local partner organisations. I became an appointed governor when the Trust invited Age UK Stockport to put forward a representative.

#### What previous experience do you think have helped you in your role as Governor?

I worked in the NHS for many years, mainly in Stockport, in community health services and later in service development and commissioning, giving me a good understanding of services. However, I also think that all life experiences can contribute to the role; being a service user, listening, how you deal with information, and being prepared to ask the right questions.

#### What aspects of the role of Governor particularly interest you?

I am particularly interested in the development of effective partnerships between health and social services, other public sector services and the 3rd sector, working together to make a real difference to the health and well-being of our local population. This of course is what the newly established Integrated Care Systems are all about.





#### What do you most want to achieve as a Governor?

I want to see the Trust delivering high quality services in a timely manner and with the best possible clinical outcomes, as well as being a great place to work and attracting good staff.

While wanting the best, I am well aware of the tremendous pressures the Trust is dealing with the build-up of waiting lists through the pandemic, the increase in A&E attendance and need for emergency admission, and the challenges of discharging patients in a timely manner due to pressures in social care. And with winter on its way, these pressures may well increase further.

#### What do you consider to be the most important about being a Governor?

The Council of Governors is the voice of the community ensuring local people have a say in the running of their local hospital and community health services.

The role of governors is an important one – we hold a position that can give us a good understanding of local views and concerns, while standing outside of the Board and perhaps seeing things from a different perspective and offering different challenges. It's important to ask the right questions to keep the Trust moving in the right direction.

#### What advice would you give to anyone thinking of becoming a Governor?

Being a governor is a responsibility but also very rewarding. I would encourage anyone interested in being part of this 'making a difference' to consider standing. Governors are elected for three years so there are regular opportunities for new people to join.


